Then, the group produced prose and poetry in response to these stories. Finally, they co-created zines with the community to explore their dreams and wishes.

Barred from legally accessing electricity due their statelessness, households in Kampung Air and Kampung Bangau-Bangau resort to illegal cable-tapping. This results in multiple struggles: frequent fires, blackouts, and police inspections. Based on these struggles with electricity access, this team has curated this walkthrough exhibition. The exhibition features a before-and-after experience, photographs, and a short video with interviews that show how the team's effort to help install solar panels in schools has improved daily lives and learning conditions.

In Thailand, elephant conservation is imbricated with and often reliant upon the tourism industry. Discordant tourist desires for performative elephant experiences versus "natural" elephant interactions have challenged caretakers striving to implement the best model of care for elephants under their guardianship. This exhibition spotlights the human side of elephant care—from an indigenous community that has lived with elephants for over 250 years to a wildlife veterinarian. This mixed-media exhibition comprises a photobook, minidocumentary, soundscapes, drawings, and found objects, inviting you to explore the richness, diversity, and complexity of elephant care in Chiang Mai.

This play on "HDB" (Housing & Development Board) invites audiences to rethink what "home" means, humanising experiences of displacement and exploring how housing, belonging, and identity intertwine in Singapore's urban landscape.

Through illustrating period anecdotes in a fun and colourful manner, and providing concise information bites, they hope to help destigmatise menstruation for a younger audience.

This team turned to cultural mapping to understand the emotional and spatial dislocations that followed, focusing on everyday life anchored in communal places like Margaret Drive Hawker Centre. Their exhibition comprises of a zine, wherein the group interrogates ideas of cultural preservation, questioning why our society romanticises hawker culture even as the landscapes that sustain it disappear.

Led by the Karen people, Huay Pakkoot village pioneers community-based elephant tourism. However, local mahouts and elephants face economic instability amid preserving while striving to preserve cultural heritage. Step inside to experience a slice of daily life, and stay for a documentary screening that captures the rhythms, responsibilities, and resilience of a community working to protect its land, culture, and elephants.

Through images and reflections, the book mirrors the community's own journey — one that is rooted in tradition and brewed slowly through shared conversations, labour, and friendships.

Through playful storytelling, the book introduces families to composting, encouraging them to rethink waste and embrace sustainable habits starting from their own gardens.

This exhibition showcases the transformation of clay, paralleling the upcycling of mangrove fruit into a jelly product. Through handcrafted vessels, the exhibition invites reflection on how ecological care and local traditions can evolve together in a changing landscape.

Such an approach enhances their empathetic communication and increases community buy-in.

Their interactive installation, built from recycled materials and wire mesh, traces the school's transformation, reimagining waste not merely as a problem, but also as a resource for change and environmental renewal.

Their exhibition features drawings by younger students and films by older ones, alongside the team's own photos, offering a powerful glimpse into how waste permeates both the landscape and daily life of this riverside community.

This team produced a documentary detailing the origin of Inkram, their partner organisation, and its founder, Pi' P. Pi' P speaks about his aim to helping his village economically and legitimise their roles as forest protectors, especially as most of the villagers do not have Thai citizenship. Through their work, the group also hopes to promote organic farming as a more environmentally friendly option that safeguards the health of individuals from fertiliser and pesticide overuse.

At the Festival, their performance —featuring reimagined dialogues and narratives of the indigenous Talaandig community— gives voice to these reflections on the cultural significance of bamboo in the Philippines and its relationship with the communities built around this plant.
